"Josh is a real hustler, a fast volleyer at the net," King said. "Yost is a good all-court player."

The Falcons will get some good tennis tips and advice on their individual games from their new coach.

Keith Morrison is a teaching pro at Farmington Tennis Club and also the No. 4-ranked player in southeast Michigan in the men's 35 age group.

Farmington's top players are senior Scott McKay and sophomore Wade Clark, with McKay, who is also a pole vaulter on the track team, holding down the No. 1 position.

"If he maintains his composure out there, he'll do pretty well," Morrison said. "That's the main thing with most my kids. They get too shy or too anxious and try to overplay."

"I tell them all the time, if they keep their composure and never give up, they

can win a lot of matches."

McKay's experience gives him the edge over Clark, who played doubles last year and is good competition for McKay in practice. Morrison also thinks a national ranking in boys 16 could be in Clark's future.

Senior Dolen Mikhail, a transfer from North Farmington, will play No. 3 singles and is a state's player.

"He's one of those kids nobody likes to play because he's patient," Morrison said. "He'll tell you to sleep and when you fall into his game he takes over."

Senior Scott Bowen will play No. 4 singles. Sophomore Andy Pister played doubles last year and teams with freshman Daniel Orendel at the No. 1 spot.

"Andy proved last year he was a good doubles player," Morrison said. "This year, with Daniel, I think he'll be even better. I'm going to work with them and try to make them into the premier doubles team around here."

Sophomores Todd Afterbaugh and Scott May started the season at No. 3 doubles, and other possible doubles players are senior Scott Matthews, junior Patrick Lee and freshman Chris Lee.

The Falcons were 7-4 in league duals last year, finishing sixth overall.

"I have faith in these kids," Morrison said. "In our division, I think we'll do well. If we get any wins from the bottom

half of the lineup, I think we'll do fine."

Farmington Harrison

The Hawks might not challenge for the WIAA championship, but they won't be pushovers either.

Harrison was 3-5-2 in league duals and tied with Plymouth Canton for seventh place overall, but the Hawks hope to improve those numbers.

"I think we have good depth; we may surprise some teams," Harrison coach Bernie Goldstein said. "We'll be competitive and, if we get a couple breaks, we could be up there."

One of two exchange students will play No. 1 singles. Senior Yannick Thomsen was a tournament player in Denmark until a few years ago and will replace Jeff Gutman.

"He hasn't played for a while, but by the end of the season I think he can be decent," Goldstein said, adding Thomsen brought only one racket and didn't intend to play tennis.

Senior Howie Kaye played lower singles last year and steps into the No. 2 spot. He made strides at the end of last season and is the fastest player on the team, according to Goldstein.

Senior Michael Galt of Germany, the other exchange student, will play No. 3 singles and also get better as the season progresses. Goldstein said the Hawks emphasize having fun and Thomsen and Kaye fit with that approach.

"They meet people this way and make friends," he said. "Both are bright kids,

and this will be part of the fun for them over here."

Seniors Scott Turbow and Sean Frith were supposed to play last week with the winner getting the No. 4 singles spot. The other will play doubles.

"Both are very steady players," Goldstein said. "If they played a hundred matches, they'd be 60-60; that's why I haven't decided."

The one doubles team was set since seniors Brian Atkinson and Jon Stern have played there the last two years.

"If they play seriously, they could be one of the better doubles teams in the area," Goldstein said, adding the Hawks also have more fun than any team in the area. "High school sports are supposed to be fun, and we play it that way."

Junior Casey McDonnell and sophomore Sean Barfield comprise the No. 2 doubles team. Both hit hard and like the net, which will help a lot, Goldstein said.

The lower at four singles will team with freshman Farid Pysakhov at No. 3 doubles. Pysakhov is being groomed for a high singles position next year.

Sophomores David Kupferer and Chris Leland will play No. 4 doubles with the expectation of jumping to No. 1 doubles or even singles next year.

"In keeping 20 players instead of the usual 10, because we're top-heavy with seniors," Goldstein said. "But we also have some good, young players. We won't be much weaker next year, because they'll get experience and improve."

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has advised the City of Farmington Hills that it is entitled to receive \$151,000 for the 1995/96 Community Development Block Grant Program Year. These funds have been authorized by the U.S. Department of Act of 1974 and 1977, as amended. In addition, the Housing Rehabilitation Program will have a fund balance of \$125,000 and an estimated \$60,000 will be received in program income from the Housing Rehabilitation activities. Notice is hereby given that on Monday, April 24, 1995, at 1:30 p.m., Eastern Standard Time, in the Council Chambers of the City Hall, 31555 Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, at which time and place the Farmington Hills City Council will conduct a Public Hearing to discuss the Consolidated Plan and the proposed use of Community Development Block Grant funds (action plan one year use of funds).

The purpose of this plan is to inventory the Housing and Community Development needs of low- and moderate-income persons in Farmington Hills. The Plan will then be used to guide decision making in the distribution of federal grant funds received by the City. Included in the plan will be a Five Year Strategic Plan and the proposed use of the City's annual Community Development Block Grant funds.

In summary, the Five Year Strategic Plan has identified the following priority of housing needs:

1. Housing Rehabilitation - to maintain existing housing stock
2. Affordable Senior Citizen housing
3. Rental subsidy programs
4. First-time buyers programs

The proposed statement of Community Development Objectives and Projected Use of Funds for the 1995/96 CDBG Program Year is as follows:

PROPOSED STATEMENT OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM 1995/96
City of Farmington Hills

The City of Farmington Hills has considered the various eligible projects which may be undertaken with Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. These activities range from construction of sidewalks, storm/sanitary sewers, water lines, and street paving to public services, code enforcement, historic preservation, etc. After careful evaluation of these projects, it has been determined that the highest priority of needs for low and moderate income areas in the community would be achieved through the following expenditure of CDBG funds:

Activity	1994/95 Budget	Proposed 1995/96
Housing Rehabilitation	\$217,785.00	\$234,000.00*
Capital Improvements	\$20,500.00	\$22,000.00
Administration	\$4,000.00	\$4,000.00
Total:	\$242,285.00	\$260,000.00*

*Includes program income (\$60,000) and fund balance (\$133,000)

Capital improvement projects for possible consideration include:

Track Road Reconstruction (Section 28)	\$75,000.00
Balswine Intersection Improvements (Section 28)	\$3,000.00
Grand River Improvements (Section 28 and 34)	\$22,000.00
Right-of-way safety improvements - street and pedestrian lighting	
Total:	\$100,000.00

Please note that only a portion of these projects could be completed due to the funding levels. It is felt, however, that an opportunity for public discussion should be given on these projects.

All projects proposed with the use of the 1995/96 CDBG funds, as noted above, will benefit low and moderate income areas or persons defined in the 1990 U.S. Census.

All CDBG activities have been designed to avoid the displacement of persons. In the event displacement becomes necessary, the City will assist displaced persons in accordance with the Federal Uniform Relocation Act.

The 1994/95 CDBG Program - the Final Statement of Community Development Objectives and Projected Use of Funds for 1994/95 Program Year included the above distribution of funds. It is anticipated that on June 30, 1995 the end of the Program Year, the status of the expenditures will be as follows:

HOUSING REHABILITATION: 81% EXPENDED
(Approximately \$125,000 will be carried over for future rehabilitation activities.)

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS: Linden Drainage Improvement completed with 100% expended (\$101,444.00)
Kamberton Park Street Lighting completed with 100% expended (\$12,000)
Middlebelt/Eldon Storm Drains under construction (Estimated cost \$125,000)
Grand River R.O.W. improvements under construction (Estimated Cost: \$50,000)
GHI Road sidewalk - project cancelled with funds used for Middlebelt/Eldon Storm Drains (\$0)
Eldon/Independence intersection improvements under construction (Estimated cost: \$12,500)

ADMINISTRATION: 100% EXPENDED (\$4,000.00)

Also, no persons will be displaced by the above activities.
