Student, band director to make trek to Europe

A local student musician and a local band director will be participating in a European tour this summer.

Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp will send four musical groups to Europe this summer where they will tour eight countries from the Mediterranean Sea to the North Sea.

A record 322 musicians and singers will visit Austria, Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, Luxembourg, Italy and the Netherlands during June and July as part of Blue Lake's International Exchange Program.

In return, Blue Lake and more than two dozen Michigan communities will host five European groups that will visit Michigan.

Andy Kawa, a Catholic Central High School student, will play viola during the tour. He is the son of Barbara and Conrad Kawa of Farmington Hills.

Since 1970, nearly 20,000 American, European and Asian musicians, singers and dancers have participated in Blue Lake's international program, according to Blue Lake vice president Gretchen Stansell.

Blue Lake groups that will tour Europe during June and July include a 100-piece symphony orchestra, 105-member concert band, 90-voice choral ensemble and 22-piece jazz band.

The symphony orchestra, under the direction of Blue Lake president Fritz Stansell, will present concerts in Michigan and Illinois before leaving for Europe, all four

Water makes life on Earth possible, and in the interest of curbing water pollution, the Oakland County 4-H office is offering *Give Water a Hand* guides at (810) 868-0899.

These materials identify water quality issues in the community. The extension offers these questions to see what actions residents can take to prevent water pollution:

- At home, do you use sand or cat litter on icy sidewalks instead of salt? Commercial salt can be harmful to the grass, trees, flowers and animals and can run off

into nearby waterways.

- At home or school, do you use cleaning products which don't contain hazardous products? Nonhazardous products include baking soda, vinegar, citrus cleanser and soap flakes.
- When you do yard work, do you leave leaves and grass clippings out of street gutters? It is best to leave lawn clippings on the yard to decompose, or compost leaves and grass in a compost pile.
- Do you celebrate Earth Day After Day or other environmental holidays to teach others about water issues?
