The 1995 spring turkey season begins April 24 in selected management units across the state and runs through the end of May. Those bucky hunters who received a permit and make the trek to the turkey woods should find good numbers of birds.

"I'm looking for an excellent season," said John Urbain, upfland gamebird specialist with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. "We counted better then 88,000 birds during out winter count, which is the most we've ever counted."

Urbain attributed the high numbers to a mild spring in '94, which resulted in a good repuduction rate. The spring of '93 was much colder and wetter that last year, and the reproduction last year, and the reproduction last year, and the reproduction

year, and the reproduction was down considerably,

which resulted in the cancellation of last year's fell turkey hunt. A limited fall hunt will return this fall in Area J (Gaylord area) and a newly creasted area in Isabella County.

Although there are still some left-over spring permits available for areas in the Upper Peninsula anomy. Urbain expects the DNR will issue more than 55,000 permits for the spring hunt. Last year, 54,338 permits were issued for the spring hunt. The number of applicants has also risen with 78,300 hunters applying for the 1995 apring hunt compared to 73,800 applying for the 1994 hunt. "There are more birds out there than in the peat, and hunters can expect to find more birds of the weather cooperates," added Urbain. "I'm looking for an excellent season. I think we'll harvest over 13,000 birds this spring, which will be a new record."

The old record of 12,931 was set in 1993. Hunters took 11,429 gobblers last apring.
