## Satisfy your 'yen' for Oriental cuisine at Wing Hong

Got a "yen" for shrimp stir-fried in a wok or sized on a hibachi? At Wing Hong Restaurant, at 14 Mile and Orchard Lake roads in Farmington Hills, you don't have to make such decisions.

You can have your dim sum and eat your sushi, too. Wing Hong actually houses two restaurants, one Chinese and the other a Japanese steakhouse.

"We are the only restaurant in the state of Michigan that serves so many varieties of cuisine," said owner Wing Hong. "We have a Cantonese chef, a Szechuan chef, a sushi chef, we even have a noodle chef."

Sachiko Brown, who works in the sushi bar, pointed to its well-stocked glass compartments and said, "This is the kind of fish you

don't get in the supermarket. This is from a special distributor. A-plus quality. Fresh, for sushi."

"We also serve blow fish," Hong added. "If you don't know how to eat it, it's dangerous. The fish is delicious, but the bladder is dangerous."

Talk about a fatal attraction! Hong said the most famous food in China is Cantonese. "About 30 years ago, I met a French chef from the London Chop House. He said the best food is Cantonese. The sauce is

the best of everything. The sauce has a distinctive taste."

Wing Hong Restaurant offers a large selection of authentic Cantonese dishes, along with Mandarin and Szechuan specialties. Their seafood and house special selections are especially tempting, like their Mandarin Crispy Duck or Lobster with Ginger and Green Onion.

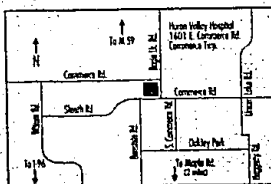
