High school kids offer solutions to parking problems

A handful of Parmington High

A handful of Fermington High students are seeking a solution for another handful causing parking problems. Residents on Loomis Street and Loomis Court have complained about students parking on their atreets. They say students loiler, litter and clog the right of way.

"We had 13 to 14 cars at first," said Loomis resident William Meloney at Mouday's Farmington City Council meeting. "Last time I counted it was 31."

Farmington City Council grant-

I counted it was 21."

Parmington City Council granted permit-only parking status for
the Loomis area. Council did the
same for Lakeavy and Prospect
streets last year, which is part of
the reason student parking has
migrated to Loomis and Loomis
Court.

Another reason is Farmington
High is no longer selling student
parking permits. The school sold
300 permits for 265 spaces. However, there are empty spots in the
lot daily.
Permit-only parking is seen as
a stop-gap measure. The Traffic
and Safety Board found 23 of the
29 homeowners in the Loomis
area approved of permit parking.

"Our concern as a city is we're
always pushing back on the real-

Student government class — including teacher Kevin Kans-man — proposed other solutions. One is to make the school pro-vide more parking. Another is to encourage students to car pool.

Providing enough parking on school grounds may not be enough, though Students often park away from the school so they can leave early.

"I was told they would walk from City Park just to have a car," Kansman said.

One solution could be to allow students to park on the east side of Prospect, north of Shiawassee, officials said.

Parking was prohibited there when buses used to pick up students on the west side of the building. Buses now deliver to the front of Farmington High on Shiawassee. Council is considering the idea that would accommodate 25 to 30 cars.

Campbell also wants city officials to meet with Superintendent Bob Maxifeld and other school officials. Students should also be involved, Campbell aid.
