Mr. Murphy was a graduate of Mackenzie High school and attended Lawrence Tech University.

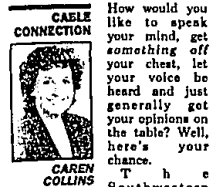
He was a Korean Army veteran.
