VERY QUIET ELECTION

Lytle Wins Out Over Pangborn for Highway Commissioner

BIG VOTE FOR JUDGE SMITH

Complete Returns on Township Ticket. Report of the Various Amounts Raised by the Voters

Naturally with only one local ticket in the field, election day in Farmington was a rather tame affair. Less than 300 ballots were cast and the day passed off without excitement.

Aside from the contest on circuit judge, interest centered on the strife for highway commissioner as Wm. Pangborn was running on slips against Thomas Lytle, the regular nominee. The latter won out easily with 182 votes to 69 for his opponent.

The state ticket received 265 votes of which 225 were Republicans and 42 Democrats.

The Amendment received 176 votes to 79 against the measure.

Judge Geo. W. Smith was very generously remembered by his friends who gave him 227 votes while his Democratic opponent, Theo D. Halpin of Lapeer county, only received 42.

The voters adopted the reports of the township officers and voted to raise \$1.50 on the thousand to complete the graveling of the road to Hatton's corners, the balance of the fund to be used in the discretion of the board.

A hundred dollars was voted to be raised for bounty fund to be used at the same rates as last year.

Two thousand dollars were raised for road repair fund and \$500 for highway improvement.
