

# O'Connell breaks Mercy record in 1,600

Senior Eileen O'Connell set a school record in the 1,600-meter run Tuesday to lead Farmington Hills Mercy to another dual-meet track victory.

The Marlinas whipped host Harper Woods Regina, boasting their Catholic League record to 2-1 and overall mark to 4-2.

O'Connell won the 1,600 in 5:12.4, bettering the record set in 1979 by Michelle Collins of 5:13.1.

She also won the 800 (2:35.6) and ran the first leg of the winning 1,600 and 3,200 relays.

O'Connell, Lisa Nobles and Brandy Johnson joined Betsy Gignac to win the 1,600 relay (4:38.5) and Jackie Segue to win the 3,200 (11:15.3).

Mercy's Amy Buhl was a three-event winner in the high jump (4-6), 100 hurdles (16.2) and 300 hurdles (55.3).

The Marlinas had other firsts from Jennifer Bruneal, discus (91-3); LaQuette Freeman, 200 dash

(29.6), Johnson, 400 dash (1:07.1); and Mandy Phelps, 3,200 run (12:58.2).

At the Livonia Stevenson Invitational Saturday, O'Connell won the 400 dash with a season best of 1:00.2, and the 3,200 relay team of O'Connell, Gignac, Segue and Nobles also had a winning time and season best of 9:57.3.

The Marlinas were second in the 1,600 relay with the foursome of O'Connell, Nobles, Freeman and Johnson.

**RADERS RUNNER-UP** North Farmington won two events and placed second in the 13-team Stafford Relays at Walled Lake Western Saturday.

Ava Lala, Carrie May, Monica Czerwinski and Heather Burcar won the sprint medley relay in 3:01.3.

Aisha Gordon and Melissa Gratz combined efforts with Michelle Marso to win the shot put (39-94) and with

Burcar for second in the discus (255-10). In a pair of second-place finishes, Lala and May also connected with Erika Anderson and Czerwinski in the 800 relay (1:51.9) and Tricia Traczky and Burcar in the 1,600 (4:18.9).

The Raiders also took third in the discus 400 relay (5:08) with the team of Gratz, Olivia Kasbar, Rachel Stalagold and Marso.

North had fourth place in the high jump (May, Marso and Traczky), 13-8; shuttle hurdles (Stephanie Auld, Marso, Katie Attk and Gordon), 11:04; and the long jump (Burcar, Beth Purcell and Caroline Gregory), 41-34.

The 3,200 relay team of Meg Wolff, Kerrie Simpson, Dana Huakin and Doree Lehnman was sixth (11:20.1), and the distance medley unit of Jill Turner, Robyn Steinlauf, Amanda Hough and Becky Naglik was sixth (14:51.8).

Plymouth Salem had 68 points, the Raiders 58 and Novi 51.

**HAWKS IN 2ND PLACE** Farmington Hills Harrison also fared well in weekend competition, finishing second at the Algonquin Mustang Classic.

Monique Anderson, Erika Greene, Krista Snow and Devron Kennedy won the 400 relay (51.8) and missed tying the

meet record by one 10th of a second. Greene and Snow also combined with

Patil Dixon and Sarah Hene for first place in the shuttle hurdles (1:18.4) and with Rachel Buckley for second in the long jump (43-04).

Kennedy anchored the winning 1,600 relay team (4:15.9) that included Amy Jenkins, Allison Nos and Kristin Knutson.

Harrison had six additional second-place finishes, including two in individual events from Snow, 100 hurdles (16.0); and Kennedy, 100 dash (12.9).

Kristin Schlicher, Jenny Lapinski and Nos were teamed with Jenny Hanawa in the 800 relay (2:37.8) and Kennedy and Lisa Scholer, 11:54.

Jessie Adams was first with 107 points followed by Harrison with 100. Twenty-five teams competed.

Harrison also had thirds in the shot put (Mandi Berg, Dixon and Karelin Andruszewski), 58-44; and the combined individual time 1,600 (Nos, Schlicher and Lisa Scholer), 11:54.

Rebecca Adams was first with 107 points followed by Harrison with 100. Twenty-five teams competed.

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lasted about 10 to 15 minutes. It worked out OK for us."

Though the Raiders haven't won a dual meet, North coach Todd Schultz thought his team could be competitive based on the Observers Relays results, but even he was surprised — and elated — when told his team had won.

"The hardest part is going to be telling my kids," he said. "I still think they competed well, and nothing can take away from what they did."

"We've been short on points all year. Just a few points here or there and we could have a much different record. Maybe it will motivate us to do well in our remaining meets."

Harrison was led by senior Ehsan Allos, who won the 400- and 200-meter dashes and ran a leg of the winning 800 relay.

He would have won the 100, too, but for a rule that precludes second-best runners from win-

ning. Allos had the best time at 11.2 but could place no higher than third.

Kevin Bryant won the high hurdles and probably would have won the 300 intermediates but allowed too soon at the end, allowing teammate Steve Catherman and North's Brian Kristall to slip ahead.

Jason Granger won the long jump, was second in the 100 and anchored the 800 relay that included Jerrard Johnson and Bryant. Nick Shaleb won the discus.

North had individual wins from junior Rich Beal in the 100 and sophomore Andrew Wantuck in the 3,200 — a race that produced an act of sportsmanship by his teammates.

Wantuck needed three points to earn his varsity letter, but his older teammates allowed him to win (five points for first place) so that he could.

The Raiders swept the event

with freshman Jon Berman taking second, senior Tom Stamboulis third and junior Brian Rajdl fourth.

"That was a class move by Stamboulis and Rajdl," Schultz said. "Rajdl said if Wantuck wasn't near he was going to step back and let Tom win, because he's a senior and it's his last year."

"I thought we could sweep it if Jon and Andrew ran good times. The distance crew has worked hard, and it's paying off for them."

North also won the 3,200 relay with Niraj Niak, Steve Chen, Stamboulis and Rajdl, and Beal. Duane Wilder, Russell Snow and Phil Zaid won the 1,600 relay and the Raiders.

"We just put (Snow) in the 400 a week and a half ago," Schultz said. "We thought it would be a better race for him."

Farmington's Corey Minous won the shot put. Keith Sudheimer, high jump; Tom May, 1,600; Scott McKay, pole vault; and Phil Giovanni, 800.

Ryan Lewis, Minous, Eric Rottenberger and Jeremy Biddle also gave the Falcons first in the 400 relay.

"Our 400 relay has been this close (holding fingers together) to Harrison for three years," Farmington coach Chip Bridges said. "Tom May, as a sophomore, just lost the 1,600, and he came back in that race today. I'm really proud of him."

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE C-95, a Special Ordinance Conditionally Approving the Transfer of The Cable Television Franchise Granted to MetroVision Of Oakland County, Inc. Authorizing The Mayor To Enter Into A Franchise Transfer Agreement, And Providing For An Effective Date.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1. Grant of Conditional Consent To Transfer. Pursuant to the Franchise Ordinance, the City's consent to the transfer of the Franchise and the System from MetroVision to TWEAN is hereby GRANTED, subject specifically to the conditions that the Ordinance creates within thirty (30) days from the date this Ordinance is enacted the Franchise Transfer Agreement in the form attached hereto as Exhibit 1, each exhibit being incorporated herein and made a part hereof.

Section 2. Consent To Transfer Denied If Conditions Not Met. If the Commission fails to satisfy any of the conditions specified in Section 1 hereof, then the City's consent to the transfer is DENIED, pursuant to Franchise Ordinance.

Section 3. Authorization to Enter Into Franchise Transfer Agreement. The Mayor is hereby authorized to enter in the Franchise Transfer Agreement with MetroVision and TWEAN having the terms and conditions set forth in Exhibit 1 attached hereto.

Section 4. Public Meeting. It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed is open to the public as required by law, and that such public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given as required.

I. **BONDING PROPOSITION -**  
**PRIMAIRY FOR REMODELING BUILDINGS AND TECHNOLOGY**  
Shall Clarenceville Schools, Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, borrow the sum of not to exceed Four Million Four Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand (\$4,425,000) Dollars and issue its general obligation unlimited tax bonds therefor, for the purposes of:  
• partially remodeling and partially re-equipping the Rotaford and Grandview Elementary Schools, Clarenceville Middle School and Clarenceville High School and improving the site; and  
• acquiring, installing and equipping the above school facilities for technology.

II. **MILLAGE PROPOSITION -**  
**BUILDING AND SITE SINKING FUND TAX LEVY**  
Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in the Clarenceville School District of Oakland and Wayne Counties, Michigan, be increased by and the Board of Education be authorized to levy not to exceed 0.75 mills (75¢ on each One Thousand Dollars of taxable value) for a period of ten (10) years, 1995 through 2004, inclusive, to create a sinking fund for the repair of school buildings? The estimate of revenue the School District will collect if the millage is approved and levied in the 1995 calendar year is approximately One Hundred Eighty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$185,000) from local property taxes authorized herein.

PLEASE TAKE FURTHER NOTICE THAT THE BONDS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT, IF APPROVED BY A MAJORITY VOTE OF THE ELECTORS AT THIS ELECTION, WILL BE GENERAL OBLIGATION UNLIMITED TAX BONDS PAYABLE FROM GENERAL AD VALOREM TAXES.
