

## CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON INCREASING PROPERTY TAXES

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills will hold a Public Hearing at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, May 22, 1995 in the City Council Chambers at City Hali, 31555 W. Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, on the levying, in 1995, of a proposed increase of \$.1833 Mills (\$.1833 per \$1,000 SEV) over the base tax rate for storm drain construction and debt, the acquisition of presents and other could impropore and the statement of presents and early and other country and statements. of property and other capital improvements as well as increased operating costs, pursuant to Act 5, Public Acts of Michgian 1982 and on the proposed 1995-96 Budgets.

If adopted, the proposed additional millage would inrease revenues from ad valorem property taxes in 1995 otherwise permitted by Act 5, Public Acts of Michigan, 1982, by approximately 2.13% over the 1994 base tax rate of \$8.6088 Mills. The City presently is authorized to levy \$9.1220 Mills for operating purposes and parks capital improvements.

The millage rate increase results from adjustments to the 1994 tax levy of \$.1833 Mills to fund inflationary increases in the Fiscal 1995-96 Budget.

The recommendation for 1995-96 levy is \$8.2921 The recommendation for 1995-96 levy is \$8.2921 Mills (\$8.2921 per \$1,000 SEV) for operating and captial improvement purposes. The \$5000 Mill (\$5000 per \$1,000 SEV), approved by the voters on May 7, 1991 for Parks and Recreation Capital Improvements, will also be levied in addition to \$.3729 Mill (\$.3729 per \$1,000 SEV) for exempt debt. 


