# Bear hunters challenge anti-hunting legislation

The topic of the symposium was baiting and hound hunting for Michigan black bear, the same hunting techniques which the hunting techniques which ballot initiative would ban.

The symposium was sponsored by the Michigan Humane Society and the Great Bear Foundation. Anti-hunters were well represented by members of CUB (Citizens United for Bear) which is a conglomeration of several anti-hunting groups including The Fund for Animals, the Michigan Humane Society and Sportsmen and Property Owners Rights and Tactics. CUB is spearheading the ballot initiative.

Fortunately, dozens of con-cemed hunters also attended the symposium — a show of hands midway through the day-long pro-gram indicated there were more that the last minute, two hunt-ers. At the last minute, two hunt-er representatives were allowed to join panel discussions to express

our views on the techniques in question. Rest assured, we were very well represented. Steve Haleen, past president of the Michigan Bear Hunters Asso-ciation, spoke in defense of hound hunting and Richard P. Smith, a hunting and Richard P. Smith, are nearoused outdoor writer and au-ther from Marquette, spoke in de-fense of batting. Both men spoke with confidence and poise and backed up their claims with bio-logical and scientific facts, some-thing the anti's couldn't do. Each also took his turn erposing some of the half-truths put forth by the anti's. When questioned, the in-accuracies were not disputed. Un-checked, they would have been perceived as fact.

The anti's will tell you the ban is in the best interest of the black bear because Michigan's black bear need to be protected. They won't tell you that because of sound game management practices, which includes regulated hunting, the black bear is thriving in Michigan with a growing population of between 8,000 and 10,000

animals.
They'll say we should leave the animals alone, but they fail to realize we have already interfered. Development annually destroys thousands of acres of critical habitat for many animal species. Through programs to improve and protect habitat in the remain-

ing wild areas, programs supported by hunter money, we can continue to maintain viable and thriving wildlife populations.

The anti's will say bailing and hound hunting are unsporting and that the animals don't have a chance. They won't tell you that despite these two techniques the success rate of harvesting a bear in Michigan is just 27-percent. The odds are heavily in favor of the bear.

The anti's will say hunters are only interested in the kill, not the welfare of the species. They won't tell you that in the last 25 years, because of hunter concerns, the black bear has stien from a variety of the species.
