Lee, Roth lead North to late-inning win

Mark Lee scored the winning run in the bottom of the ninth inning Monday and was the winning pitcher as North Farmington edged Livonia Stevenson, 4-3.

With one out, Lee singled, stole second and scored when a ground ball off the bat of Jeff Light went through the shortstop's legs for an error.

Lee pitched the final four innings in relief of starter Steve Parks in the bottom of the ninth, allowing three hits but no walks or runs while striking out four.

Robert Roth had a big game at the plate for the Raiders, going 4-for-4 with a double, one RBI, two stolen bases and a run scored.

Lee had two hits and an RBI, and Ronnie Minc hit a run-scoring double in the first inning to give North the lead, which it held until Steve Benson tied the single run in the fifth.

The Raiders are 5-3 in the Lakes Division and 6-5 overall, the Spartans 0-9 and 3-13.

Matt Bruys, who entered the fourth inning in place of starter Mike Allison, suffered the loss.

Scott Craver had an RBI single for Stevenson, tying the score at 3-3 in the sixth.
