In style

The grandeur of the house is seen in such features as oak and walnut paneling from Germany's Black Forest, carved marble mantles, pillars and marble floors from Italy, 12 fireplaces and the largest installation of Pewable tile in southeast Michigan. When Salley donated the mansion, he stipulated that the style had to be maintained — for example, there was to be no painting over wood, no fresh nail holes.

A room by Joan Knight of Joan Knight Interiors of Southfield is both elegant and comfortable. The room bears Pewable tile, glistening with a glase developed by Pewable's Mary Chase Stratton, who never revealed the formula. The lush floral carpet and large green ottoman with brocade pattern pick up the shades of the marble fireplace and the green sponged walls, and the design of the ceiling moulding. Plaid draperies echo the woodwork of the window pane. Statellness is conveyed through such items as the two round torchieres with a ilon in the center (which originally stood on both sides of the bishop's bed) and the wood frame bearing carved images of the apostles Matthew, Mark, Luke and John that goes around the fireplace and mantel. Doors along one wall were different sizes; a woodwork arch was painted over the smallest door, making it seem the same size as the others.

McGowen Amo Laverne Short of McGowen Associates of Rochester created a dreamlike music room. Flecks of paint add glimmering spots to the walls. In keeping with the musical instruments in the room, names of composers and writers line the perimeter near the ceiling.

The ante-room or traveler's study by Joseph Keenan and Sheila York of Keenan and York of Birmingham mises the classic and contemporary. Keenan and York designed the checkored red and black wallpaper with regal emblem specially for the showhouse. The tall pedeatels, draperies and seat cushions in the room are white; sleek crystal and sliver accessories are among heavier pieces.

Sitting rooms
P.K. Fields of P.K. Fields Interiors of Plymouth described her sitting room as "authorpine." The room has a warm glow like candlelight, with a blushing color touching for furniture, patterned carpet and plaid drapes. Candle scences and a marble fireplace rest against dark walls.
The bishop's library by Sharon Holton of Sharon Holton Interiors of Plymouth is rest-

ful with its beige walls, marble pedestals and thick rods psinted to have a black and gold marble effect. Part of the ceiling was painted to resemble lighter marble. Holton provided the old postcard of Beile Isle that was reproduced by an artist on a wall in the basement, where the seminars will be conducted. Cynthia Ohanian of Cynthia Ohanian Interiors of Birmingham made a sitting room into a "lady sideaway." Walls were pointed dusty rose, crown mouldings yellow and peach to repeat colors in the fabric. A large Venetian mirror spakeles like a giant brooch. The table at the bed is a reproduction of one originally bought by the Vanderblitz for their house in Newport.

A whimsical look is in the children's rooms by Jole de Vie of Birmingham, Rosanne Design Steps of Bloomfield Hills and Design Steps of Troy. Bright huse and artist illustrations adorn the walls by Jole de Vie and Duncan. Designers from Design Steps turned their room into a little castle, with a tub painted to look like marble, a radiator painted to look like stone and a dragon painted on one wall.

Tom Verwest of TVI Interiors of Bloomfield Hills designed a room around featured beelisks, putting a faux marble look over a radiator and tollet seat, among other places. In a servant's sitting room, Sars Scott Culien of Sara Scott Cullen Interiors of Birmingham placed a silver mat on a desk, a large pan as decor and the words "Clean Your Plate" in three-dimensional letters over a doorway.
