A new center in Farmington Hills has a different approach — mediation.

Family Centers of America Inc., 30230 Orchard Lake Road, Farmington Hills, uses the alogan 'Giving you alternatives for handling conflict."

Executive administrator and flounder Marilyn Fessler see the center, which opened in early April, and Glering options that have been lacking in dealing with family problems.
