
PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Farmington Hills City Council will give formal consideration to a proposed amendment to the official Zoning Map of the City of Farmington Hills by amending Section 34.32 of the City Code by changing the zoning classification of the following parcel of property as follows:

Rezoned from OS-1, Office Service District classification to B-2, Community Business District classification.

Parcel No. 13-10-300-010
A part of the East 1/4 of the Southwest 1/4 of Section 20, City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, having an address of 36600 Grand River Avenue.

The proponent in this matter is Aris Leiviskis, Aris-El Enterprises, Inc., who seeks this rezoning for commercial development of the property.

Falcons whip Warriors; Hawks win 2 in tourney

Tony Harvey earned his first pitching victory Tuesday as Farmington crushed host Walled Lake Western in baseball, 11-4.

Harvey, unbraten with one save to his credit, worked 3 1/2 innings and got the win despite giving up all seven hits. He struck out three and walked three.

Dan McLaughlin had a big game at the plate, going 4-for-5 with three doubles and four RBI. He also scored three runs.

Wes Cornwell, Jake Siskosky and Nick Latra (two doubles), who pitched the last 3 1/2 innings, had three hits apiece.

Siskosky also knocked in three runs, Cornwell and Latra one each. Cornwell scored three runs and Siskosky two.

On Saturday, the Falcons (12-16) won the first game of a doubleheader from visiting Redford Union 1-0 in eight innings.

Siskosky had the winning hit with a two-out single to score Tom Mondoux.

Mondoux hit safely and was sacrificed to second by Dale Domas, but McLaughlin's liner back to the pitcher was crucial because it moved Mondoux to third and scoring position, according to coach Kevin Kansman.

Latra pitched a perfect game until the seventh inning when RU pitcher Bill Morris singled. Latra finished with a one-hitter, striking out 12 without a walk.

Siskosky had three hits in that game, too, and Brian Murray two.

Farmington lost the second game 7-6 after a seventh-inning rally fell short.

The Falcons scored three times in the seventh and had runners at second and third when the game ended with a ground ball to third base.

"All we needed was a base hit," Kansman said. "If the ball had gone through, we would have won the game, because Jake was already to third."

After singles by Dan Greas and Domas and an errant pickoff, McLaughlin hit an RBI single. An overthrow at first on Latra's grounder allowed two more runs to score.

Siskosky was intentionally walked, and a wild pitch put Latra at third and Siskosky on second when the final out came.

Domas and McLaughlin had two hits and scored two runs each.

Cornwell was the losing pitcher, Mike Noonan the winner. RU led

HARRISON 5, ST. MARY'S 3: The Hawks (17-5) scored four times in the fourth inning Monday to beat the Eagles in the second round of the George Gay tournament.

Jake Lawson pitched 3 1/2 innings of scoreless relief to raise his record to 8-2. He allowed one hit and no walks, and he struck three.

Dave Hensel, Mark Cantor and Adam Snavel Friday had two Harrison hits apiece. Cantor also had two RBI, and Snavel's RBI double keyed the four-run fourth that erased a 3-1 deficit.

Matt Sullivan started for the Hawks, allowing three runs on seven hits and no walks.

In the first round Monday at Joyce Park in Pontiac, Harrison scored a run in the bottom of the seventh inning to edge Waterford Kettering 5-4.

The Hawks tied the score in the sixth when Snavel doubled and scored on Chris Puzoski's single.

The Hawks were to play Detroit Country Day in the semifinals Wednesday, but Harrison was going to be minus its seniors because of commencement exercises.

REDFORD UNION 1, NORTH 0: Under ideal circumstances, RU senior ace Brian Berryman would be looking forward to a three-day rest before his next assignment.

But Berryman, who threw a no-hitter with 13 strikeouts Tuesday in the pre-district victory over visiting North Farmington, doesn't have that luxury.
