"This is something that benefits Farmington Hills, not just people in Detroit," said Hills resident Jane Hooper, a SMART rider. "Not only do businesses here benefit from getting people to come out from Detroit, but there are many professionals who take the bus downtown."

Hooper, who teaches at Wayne State University, said cities like Boston have thrived because of their use of public transportation.

But the measure, which would maintain present services and add other routes and computerization, has its opponents. One of the most outspoken is County Commissioner David Moffitt, whose district includes northern Farmington Hills.

"I continue to encourage a 'no' vote on the tax increase, because until SMART is reorganized, the state law is changed to let Oakland County tax payers pursue that needed organization on an even playing field, voting 'yes' just gives SMART the funds to continue its inefficient and ultimately bankrupt ways."
