Police nab suspect, robberies may be drug-related

The Farmington Hills police arrested an armed robbery suspect for the second time in seven days May 25 at 250 a.m. Police said a man approached the night manager of the Farmington Hills Radiason Hotel at Grand River and 10 Mills and asked for directions. He then handed the manager a holdup note demanding money and threatmed to shoot the victim.

The man reached over the

About five minutes later, Sgt.
Gil Kohla, working in plain
clothes and driving an unmarked
car observed a car traveling at a
high rate of apped eastbound on
M.5. Kohla, who was parked on
the freeway emergency turnaround when the suspect's car
passed, noticed that the driver
matched the description of the
robber.

Farmington Hills police cars forced the suspect's car to a stop at Grand River and Middlebelt. One police car was struck by the suspect's car in an attempt to flee, but there were no injuries.

Police believe the robbery was drug related and the suspect stole the money to repay a drug debt. The suspect works at a warehouse near the hotel.

Ronald Bertrand Morast, 29, of Detroit was charged in the rob-bery. He was charged with armed

robbery, which carries a maximum life sentence, and fleeing and eluding, which is a one-year misdemeanor. Bond was set at \$20,000 cash surety. Morast, who faces a June 9 preliminary exam, is in the Oakland County Jail.

On May 19, Hills police Sgt. Tim Connor spotted a armed rob-bery auspect minutes after a rob-bery at the Farmington Hills Lit-tle Caesars at 12 Mile and Farm-ington. The auspect attempted to flee, but a high-speed chase was

aborted when a plain clothes offi-cer in an unmarked car and uni-formed officers following in marked cars forced the suspect to

John Comstock, 27, of Ferndale John Comstock, 21, of remains was charged in the robbery and waived his preliminary exam May 25. Comstock, who is also charged in two other robberies in Troy and Centerline, will face auto theft charges in Permdale. His bond was continued at \$100,000 and he remains in the Oakland County

Hills police Chief Bill Dwyer credits exceptional police work for the apprehension of the suspects. Dwyer also said officers showed skill in avoiding high-speed.


