The Oakland County Prosecu-tor's office has filed negligent homicide charges against a Grand Blanc waman for her part in the traffic death of a West Bloomfield

The woman, Elenore Marie Young, 39, had been driving a Mercury Sable, with a tire ming, that struck a Ford Teurus station wagon, driven by Jeffred Barnard Grag, 50, at 5:40 a.m. at the intersection of Northwestern and Middlebelt in Farmington Hills.

Gragg had been driving south. His car was struck in the side by Young's. He died from injuries and she was hospitalized.

Hills police have issued a war-rant for her arrest. The maximum penalty for negligent homicide, a high misdemeanor, is 2 years in prison and a \$2,000 fine.
