

POLICE/FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

■ BREAK-INS

The driver's side door lock of a green 1993 Olds was punched causing \$100 in damage and a \$400 AM/FM car stereo was stolen June 4-6.

A passenger door lock of a red 1992 Olds Cutlass was punched (\$400) in an unsuccessful break-in on Glen Cove in Farmington Hills June 5-7.

■ THEFTS

Scrap aluminum and stainless steel worth \$600 was stolen from American Steel Fabrication on Whitlock in Farmington Hills between May 24 and June 6.

A \$300 portable phone was stolen from Roosevelt's on Orchard Lake in Farmington Hills June 2.

A Yamaha clarinet and case (\$650) were stolen from Warner School on 14 Mile in Farmington Hills June 2.

■ DRUNKEN DRIVING

Farmington Hills police arrested

a Hills man, 42, for drunken driving south on Orchard Lake north of 12 Mile at 6 p.m. June 6. Another motorist phoned in, telling police that a red 1993 Dodge Ram pickup was driving erratically. The man told police he was taking medication for a back problem and could not complete a breath test to determine if he was drunk. Officers transported the man to Botsford Hospital to get a blood sample.

Farmington Hills police arrested a Hills man, 24, for drunken driving on westbound Grand River near Halsted at 2:15 a.m. June 7. The man had driven his blue 1986 Toyota Tercel through the lot of an Amoco station to avoid a red light when officers stopped him. He had a blood alcohol level of .16 percent. A level of .1 percent or greater is considered too drunk to drive in Michigan.

Farmington police arrested a Livonia woman, 32, for drunken driving on Nine Mile Road June 7. Police stopped the 1989 Olds Cutlass for speeding 40 miles per hour in a 25-mph zone. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .15 percent.

Farmington police cited a Livonia 18-year-old under the state's zero-tolerance law for underage drinking June 8. Police stopped

the 1985 Ford Tempo for speeding on southbound Farmington Road. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .04 percent. The driver had his license confiscated by police.

■ VANDALISM

The windshield was cracked, the paint scratched and the fender damaged causing \$250 in damage to a red 1993 Ford Aerostar parked at the McCabe Funeral Home on 12 Mile in Farmington Hills June 6.

Someone drove on the lawn of a Loomis Street residence leaving tire tracks June 8.

■ AUTO THEFT

A white 1991 Ford Taurus worth \$9,000 was stolen from a residence on Horton in Farmington Hills June 6-7.

Unsuccessful theft attempts of two 1995 Jeep Cherokees parked at the Strawberry Lane Apartments on Middlebelt in Farmington Hills resulted in \$300 in damage to the passenger door lock of a green Jeep and \$1,000 in damage to a black Jeep June 6-7.

■ FIRES

Farmington Hills firefighters from Stations 3 and 1 put out a smoldering oven fire at the Botsford Terrace Apartments on Independence in Farmington Hills at 2:48 p.m. June 5. The apartment maintenance worker told fire-

fighters that a neighbor smelled smoke and notified him. The apartment occupant said she had left food on the stove and then tried to extinguish the fire herself. Firefighters found the apartment full of rubbish and apparently unlivable. Damage to the property was \$2,000 and damage to the contents was \$500.

Hills firefighters from Station 1 put out a car fire in a carport at the Green Hill Apartments on Green Hill in Farmington Hills at 7:11 p.m. June 5. The 1994 Saturn engine area was totally engulfed in flame. The fire caused \$14,000 damage to the car and \$1,000 to the carport and a car next to the Saturn.

Hills firefighters from Station 1 put out a stove fire at a residence on Surrey in Farmington Hills after having to break a window to gain access. Damage was \$300 to the property and \$500 to contents.

■ DRUG POSSESSION

Farmington police ticketed a Madison Heights man, 22, for marijuana possession during a traffic stop on Grand River and Orchard Lake June 7. The man was a passenger in a 1975 Chevy Camaro, which police stopped for having a loud exhaust and a brake light out. Police noticed rolling papers and over drug paraphernalia and found 3.2 grams of marijuana in cigarette form in the man's pants pocket.

LIGHT AT END OF CARPAL TUNNEL SYNDROME
The carpal tunnel is the passageway for the wrist, through which nerves and tendons enter into the hand. When the ligament that binds the carpal tunnel becomes swollen or inflamed, the median nerve can become compressed to cause numbness and pain in the thumb, index, middle and ring fingers to which it provides sensation. According to a study done at Washington University School of Medicine at St. Louis, a combination of physical therapy, workplace modification and education can provide relief of carpal tunnel syndrome pain. When 64 carpal tunnel syndrome subjects were provided with physical therapy to stretch tight muscles and strengthen weak ones, 90% reported relief from neck and shoulder pain and 63% found relief of finger tingling and numbness after 2 months.
