Patterson openly chuckled at the thought of Dunaskias running against him. "It's the pressure of terms limits," the executive said Tuesday, "It makes usually normal people de gooft things."

Dunaskias can run for the sente only once more, in 1998—something the encutive said has colored his legic and wisdom.

"Mat Is a politician coming to the end of his career and he's looking for somewhere to land," said Patterson, mindful that

Dunaskias is an advocate of term limits who has leveled his share of criticism against career politicisms.

While Dunaskias saw the ersecutive's endorsement of SMART as a retreat from traditionally conservative policies, others saw that support as an indication of a maturing Patternon, someont willing to take a regional view of a problem.

One of Patterson's deputies, John L. Grubbe, seemed to be sware his boss had stuck his political neck out by backing SMART. "We'rs aware of SMART's problems," he said to the Democrats as he outlined his

Grubbe said there is no working model of the transit system they see SMART becoming, although the Minnespolls transit system has some of the neighborhood ser-vices Oakland voters are demand-ing.
