Tax plans OK'd; Hills man elected

Clarenceville voters approved
two millage proposals in Monday's school board election, and a
farmington Hills realdent was
elected to the board of education.
Voters approval of both millages made Superintendent David
Kamish one happy school chief.
"We are clated, very pleased,"
Kamish told a gathering of election workers in Clarenceville
Middle School as he announced
the winning numbers.
Proposal One, a \$4.4 million

bond issue to remodel school buildings, passed 528-320.
Proposal Two, a 0.75-mill sinking fund to generate \$2.1 million for repairs over 10 years, passed 523-314. This was the second stempt by Clarenceville to get voters to approve a bond issue for repairs, renovations and technology. Monday's election brought change to the Clarenceville District, which includes a portion of southeast Farmington Hills.

Scott Wood of Farmington
Hills defeated Thomas Aldridge
of Livonia for a two-year term
Wood got 408 votes; Aldridge, 307.
Incumbents Virginia Dunkles
and Ronald Silys will continue to
sit on the board, as they ran
unopposed for two four-year
terms. Dunkles got 515 votes; 51;
ye. 411.

A vacancy was created when
board President Dale Weighil
chose not to seek re-election.

Clarenceville's proposal will now be put in the hands of archi-tects, who will prepare bids and specifications, Kamish said. "Ninety percent will be completed in the summer of 1992."

The proposals passed, he said; because they were "reasonable and down-to-earth."

Wood, 31, is the sen of Dick Wood, who served 22 years on the Clarenceville board. His father was one of the first to congratu-late him Monday after Wood's win over Aldrich was announced.

Ruetenik, Siegler, Onder win board seats

For weeks, bond-issue-weary residents in the Walled Lake Consolidated School District voiced unhappiness with their school board. In an apparent quest to charge the makeup of the board, several went so far as to become candidates themselves. Such displeasure even continued at the polls on Monday, when they decided two four-year terms and a single one-year term on the board — which has been beast by controversy throughout the 1994-95 school year.

Think the school board has to show some responsibility," said Judy Wilson, after voting for chal-

lengers William Drum, Randolph Ston and Patricia Cork at the Glengary Elementary Echool precinct. She said it was time for a change in direction and that she dhad her problema with the existing board.

John Munro, who left the Glengary precinct a little while later, said two of the three people he voted for were new candidates. "Having a change of personnel series for purpose."

Not enough agreed with them. When final totals were tabulated early Tuesday morning at the

district's Educational Service Center, incumbent board members Samantha Ruetenik and Marc Siegler led the five-candidate race for two four-year terms. Voters also: elected political newcomer Alp Onder, who defeate challengers Susan Adamson and Patricia Cork for a single one-year term; voted 2,855-227 in favor of Oakland Community College's seven-year millage (eight-tenths of a mill). "It was a tough campaign," said the 65-year-old Ruetenik, a member of the achool board since 1989 who collected 2,487 votes. "There

were a lot of candidates, a lot of issues. And in the middle of it all the board has been dealing with heavy, heavy issues."

That Slegier finished second with 2,421 votes — and led the field with 414 votes in the Maple.

Elementary precinct — was par-ticularly gratifying to the 41-year-old Farmington Hills resident.

Maple residents had criticized the board, and Siegler, for last month approving the shift of stu-dents from Maple (which families in the Farmington Hills portions the district had attended) to Meadow Lake, located several miles away, in the vicinity of 14 Mile and Inkater roads.
