"It was an exceptional weekend," said Jan Pung, communications officer for Oakland County
Parks and Recreation. "We had
record numbers at the pools and
we filled the other parks."
Nearly 3,000 people ventured to
Red Oaks Waterpark in Madison
Heights. Although pool capacity
is only 2,000, "With people com-

ing and going all day, we had over 2,000," said Pung.
Likewise, Waterford Oaks Waterpark in Waterford reached its capacity of 1,200 by 1 p.m. on Thurnday, On Friday, the pool filled its capacity by 12:30 p.m.
Beach: based parks also did very well last week. At Independence Oaks County Park in Clarkston, more than 140 cars filled the parking lot on Thurnday, 'On Priday, '220 were parked. "That's definitely more than there would have been on a weekday," said Pung. "It's double the usual

amount."
"It was wall to wall," said Bill Middleton, seasonal supervisor at Independence Oaks. "The beach area has been packed from the heat. There's been a great influx around the beach and picnic areas."
At Groveland Oaks County Park in Holly, 200 cars filled the lot Friday, 300 Saturday, and 210 Sunday. All 600 camping sites were filled, and the beach and picnic areas were crowded all day. "With the heatways, the best place to be is in the water," said

Bob Fey, assistant park suprevisor for Groveland Oaks. "We had at least double the number of people from the previous week."
Addison Oaks County Park in Leonard filled all 100 of its camping sites and used overflow sites accommedate more campers. Although park supervisor Robert Coffey said that the season has been steadily busier since the beginning of July, he acknowledged a definite increase in attendance due to the hot weather. due to the hot weather.


