Mailon went on to earn a golf scholarship to Ohio State University. In 1983, at 20, ahs was the youngest person to win the Michigan Amateur Championship

Title. She won all Big Ten honors in 1984 and 1985, during her junior and senior years, and finished eccond in the Big Ten in 1985.

Mallon turned professional in 1986 and won her first victory in the 1991 Oldsmobile Classic in Plorida. In 1991, Mallon won her LPGA title when she sunk a 10-foot birdie put to mhe final hole. Currently, she ranks among the top 10 in money.
