It's been a long year for the all 14-car-old NFWB Cobras baseball

"We're absolutely thrilled, especially for the returners," said toam manager Bob Sopo. "The kids felt they earned it last year and they missed out because of an administrative mistake so we're very excited to be going this year."

The world series format calls for

three eight-team round-robina. The top four teams from each round-robin advance to the double-eilmination—championship bracket and the bottom four teams from seak will compete in a consolation bracket. The Cobras open play in the Division II round-robin and will meet teams from means from Newsda, Tennessee, Oregon, Guam, Kanasa, Ohio and Georgia. Teams from Wisconslan, Ohiahoras, Colorado, Illinois, Ohio, New York, Misacout, California, Washington, Teras, Nebraska, Indiana, Iowa, Maryland and Hawaili will bettle in the other two round-robins.

"We won a game at Doubleday Field in Cooperstown, New York carlier this year and that was the most exciting moment as far of their bassball days," explained Sopo. "Now, with this coming up, the kids are on top of cloud nine. Well get to play teams from Guam and ell over the naviton. They're very excited."

The Cobras are currently 40-8 on the year and wrap up the regular coason Tuesday with a home game, against the Oakland Mariners at Ploneer Fark (Parmington Road north of 13 Mile).
