Ownership of Alexander Hamilton Life may have gone south, but the company and its 390 jobs are staying in Farmington Hills for the "indefi-nite future."

that Alexander Hamilton Life and its individual life and annuity business had been acquired by the Jefferson-Pilot Corp. of Greensborn, N.C., for \$576 million.

owner, called the sale "positive news."

"We're being purchased by a com-pany . . . whose primary function is the insurance business," said Ritter, a Farmington Hills resident.

and be one of the top 20 companies
