

POLICE/FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

FIRE

Farmington Hills Fire Department responded to 38 calls between July 31 to Aug. 6. Of those, 45 were emergency medical calls, two for structure fires, two for vehicle fires and two for refuse fires. Hills firefighters extinguished a small fire at Specialty Steel on Sunnydale Aug. 8. Heat from gas-fueled equipment ignited electrical wires and cable insulation in the ceiling and roof area.

Hills firefighters extinguished an engine compartment fire in a vehicle on Orchard Lake Road Aug. 7. The 1990 Mitsubishi Mirage suffered \$3,500 damage. The fire was caused after an oily rag used to fill an oil hole ignited.

Hills firefighters responded to a stove fire on Ransdowne Aug. 3, which was put out on arrival. The homeowner said the fire started when she was cooking pancakes on the stove when she went up stairs to take some medication. Grease in the pan ignited. She put water on the fire, which intensified the flames. The homeowner

said the flames died out on their own. She was advised in the proper method of extinguishing grease fires.

She said she also spoke to someone at Borders' corporate offices in Ann Arbor, who said they would look into the matter.

The magazine has been pulled from the shelves, said Borders spokesman William Edwards.

"It was as much of a surprise to us as anyone else," said Edwards, who is manager of retail operations.

"We don't encounter it that often. Sometimes with the numbers of periodicals we sell, it's hard to

tell what the contents are from the cover.

Borders' policy is not to sell questionable materials to minors, Edwards said. The Farmington Hills outlet does not carry men's magazines such as Playboy or Penthouse.

A Borders outlet can carry 1990 periodicals, including maps from Europe and abroad.

"When you have that range of materials, you're going to have something that is going to be objectionable to someone," Edwards said.

The September issue of *Big Brother* came shrinkwrapped, making it more difficult to check the contents. A skateboarder is on the cover and its language leads one to think the publication is about the recreational activity, Edwards said.

The incident has made Thomas more vigilant to monitor what her two children read.

"We have to teach our children morals and values," she said. "You have to be intent on that. Otherwise, they think it's OK."
