Sowerby, Vagnozzi differ on rules



Farmington Hills mayoral candidates Aldo Vagnozzi and Paul Sowerby exchanged letters re-cently, each suggesting how the campaign should be conducted.

Candidates Aldo Vagnezzi and Paul Sowarby can't guite agree on the ground rules in the Farmington Hills' first campaign to elect a mayor direct-

Vagnozzi, a Hilla councilman,

mailed Sowerby a letter welcoming the attorney to the campaign and sug-ceating both candidates limit thair campaign spending.

The councilman also proposed that they participate in at least four de-bates during the campaign, turn down contributions from developers

who are or may be trying to build in the city, and make reports of cam-paign contributions available to the public and the media.

Sowerby, a former council member, answered Vagnorul's suggestions with a letter of his own calling for a minimum of six joint public forums and asking that Vagnorul resign his council seat while running for mayor.

The only area of agreement seems to be on the number of joint public forums.

"I suggested a minimum of four,

but six is fine with me," said Vagnox-

zi.

As to the idea of quitting the council to run for mayor, Vagnozzi azid it made no sense. Office holders do not resign to run for another office he.
