"We'd like some closure of this," Jim Anestasiow said. "The individual didn't handle the situation properly. Fin not out to go after a big leawuit."

Police have little to go on. The only description they have of the driver is he's a white male between the ages of 20-23, 5-foot-9

and 170 pounds. He's also described as wearing a black cap, having cutly halt, and possibly having the name Steve.

The boys didn't get a license number on the webicle and there are no other witnesses, Farmington Public Safety Deputy Director Mike Wiggins said. Also, the list-efference accident was not reported to police until 11:30 p.m. "It's an open accident (case.)" Wiggins said. "We have no additional information to follow up on so that we can locate the driver. There's no witnesses other than the boys.

"It (lack of witnesses) probably had everything to do with the time that elapsod (between the

accident and when police were no-tified)."




