## Summer school program gets good reviews from all involved

Teachers and parent are rush-ing over the success of the dis-tict's Summer Extending Learn-ing Program, which debuted in June. Some 142 students entering grades 24 situended the intensive 20-day program at Gill Elementa-17.

grades 2.4 attended the intensive 20. day program at Gill Elementa-ry. Reading and writing improved in all grada levels, achool officials reported. Students selected for the summer program were having difficulty in language arts. By intervening early, school of-ficials believe short-term instruc-tion can reduce the need for fu-ture remediation. "It's a wonderful program," aald Goylo Zimmerer, principal at Alameda Early Childhood Center. Parents thought so, too. Koren Dickey's son, Michael, 7. was atruggling in reading and writing. He's accelerated up three reading levels while his lotter for-mations and spelling have also improved. "As far as reading, be's im-proved dramatically," Karen Dic-key said. "He'd bring home a

Writing and spalling also improved.

All students were tested at the beginning and end of the program. A better gauge will come when they take the Michigan Educa-tional Assessment Program test this year. Fourth-graders are test-ed in reading, language arts and math.

Second and third-graders each made up one-fourth of enroll-ment. Gains were also even in reading and writing. Second-graders were brough to post-first-grader scaling levels, gaining three levels. Third-graders' reading also jumped three levels while spelling im-proved from an average of 57.8 percent correct to 80.6 percent.

What numbers couldn't reveal, though, were changes in how kids view education, said ono tescher. "By reading their comments, they were more positive," said Lies Kelly, a first-grade teacher at Wood Creek Elementary. "One child said, 'You don't have to read just for (school) work; you can read for fun." "That's a prety powerful state-
