The victory improved the Raiders to 3-0, and their next game is tonight against Farmington Hills Harrison at North.

"I'm not surprised at our start," North coach Linda Perkins said. "The players are) more focused and playing harder with each practice. I'm pleased with the progress."

May recorded a triple double with a career-high 26 points, 11 rebounds and 10 steals.

She had 16 points in the last quarter when the Raiders rallied from a 31-27 deficit to outscore

Chiefs capture Mercy Hoops crown

Sarah Warnke's outstanding individual effort earned top honors for herself and her team Saturday in girls basketball.

The senior center was named the most valuable player of the 15th Annual Mercy Hoops Classic after helping Plymouth Canton regain the title.

Warnke scored a game-high 17 points and landed 11 rebounds to lead the Chiefs in their 45-39 victory over defending champion Rochester Adams.

"Honestly, it's not a big deal to me, because it's a team effort and that's more important," Warnke said, regarding her MVP status. "We play as eight people and we win as eight people; we try not to play a one-person game."

Warnke was relentless on the

boards at both ends of the floor, and her intensity played a key role for the Chiefs (4-0).

In the two-game set, which included a 60-41 defeat of Class B power Stevensville-Lakeshore Thursday, she had 35 points and 18 rebounds. She also sank nine of 11 free throws Saturday.

"She's so quick and strong, when she gets on balance, she's real hard to guard inside," Canton coach Bob Blohm said. "Recogn-

nizing when she's double- and triple-teamed is a key part of our game, and she's improved that a lot the last two years."

Also earning a spot on the all-tournament team were Canton teammate Becky Vachow, Shannon McCoy of Adams, Farmington Hills Mercy's Mary Jane Valade and Lakeshore all-starer Katy Kamp.

The championship is Canton's fourth since 1988 and its third in the last four years.

Vachow contributed 11 points, including a pair of triples, and

teammate Melissa Marzolf scored eight of her 10 in the second half.

McCoy led the Highlanders (2-2) with 10 points, and Tamara Strong and Emily Schmidt added eight apiece.

After a sometimes wild first half with up-and-down action, the Chiefs began to take control midway in the third quarter.

"They got us into their tempo and we rushed some shots," Blohm said. "That's their style, not necessarily ours."

"We were more patient in the third quarter. We wanted to get better spacing on the floor and look to the post to see if we could get some outside-inside scores."

Vachow's triple broke a 25/28 tie with three minutes left in the third period, and Marzolf and Kristin Lukasek scored to make the lead 32-25 at the end.

Warnke scored the first basket of the fourth quarter, and the Canton lead reached 10 points (42-32) with a Warnke layup and free throw with less than two minutes left.

"Layups and free throws," Adams coach Fran Sadowski said. "If we had executed in those two areas, we'd be all set."

"We broke down defensively and didn't make layups at the other end. A one-point lead (19-18 at halftime) turned into an eight-point deficit pretty quick."

"I liked our effort. We executed everything else except those two areas. They're probably the toughest; we just didn't get it done tonight."

LAKESHORE 81, MERCY 48: Stevensville-Lakeshore clinched the Mercy Hoops Classic consolation victory with free throws in the fourth quarter Saturday.

The Lakers were 17-27 overall at the line and 8-of-12 in the last quarter. The Marlies sank 14 of 17 free throws.

Jessie Heston scored 19 points for Mercy (1-3) and Mary Jane Valade nine.

Katy Kamp had 25 points to lead Lakeshore, which led 15-7 after one quarter, 31/27 at halftime and 45-34 entering the final period.
