ter Hills, will be cheering for Kalamaroo's Mike Downey when the 1905 Quaker State Big Bass World Champlonahlp Fi-nals are held, Nov. 10-11, on Lake Marion in Haines City, Florida. That's because if Dow-ney wins the \$100,000 BBWC Finals, Owen will be the recipi-ent of a \$10,000 scholarship.

Owen caught a 5.32-pound largemouth on July 29 on Lake Laurn and in the process cap-tured the Michigan state title in the 1995 BBWC Junior Chamthe 1995 BBWC Junlor Cham-plenship. Downey landed a 9.13-pound largemouth on July 8 on Lime Kill Lake and won the Michigan state title in the 1995 BBWC Championship. Downey won a free trip to Florida to compete in the BBWC Finels. Owen won a check for \$250.

Each of the 50 BBWC state Each of the 50 BBWC state champions will compete in the BBWC Finals. The angler who catches the heaviest bass in the two-day competition will receive \$50,000 cash, a new truck, a fullyrigged Astro bass boat with a Mercury outboard and Lowrance electronics. The state winners represent their respective junior winners, so if Downey wins the BBWC Finals, Owen wins the scholarship.

Hunters may apply for an anticriess permit through the DNR's new Retail Licensing System at any DNR office that sells licenses or at any of the 1,500 license agents throughout the state.
