Surround a flat heavy piece of plywood with a strong raised rim of 2-by-4's, mitered at the corners. Sand the surfaces well. Now lacquer it a soft taupe color. Or what about thinly covering the form with a plush suede cloth? Practical and washable. I have also visited a lumber yard and bought a panelled door that I turned on its side and added legs. Here

comes that ubiquitous paint bucket.

Creating your own upholstered furniture gets a little dicey. The tilt of the of a chair, or the depth of the seat cushion is critical to its comfort. A 5foot-2-inch woman does not conform to a chair the same way a 6-foot-3-inch man will. Where the seat hits the bend of the knee is so vastly different. This would apply if you visited a furniture store and sat in a variety of chairs . . . at least you have options. The density and softness of the seat cushion may suit you, but your spouse vetos it. Be satisfied just to select the appropriate upholstery fabric after your conference.
