Library display marks Banned Books Week

Books that have been chal-lenged or banned on during the past year, will be displayed at the Farmington Hills Branch of the

past year, with company the transparent of the Farmington Hills Branch of the Farmington Community Library on 12 Mile Road during Banned Books Week, Sept. 22-30.

The works of such famous authors as William Faulkner, Mark Twain, Toni Morrison, and Laura Ingalls Wilder were banned or challenged in the last year, according to a local library source.

"A lot of people who see the display just can't believe that these books have been banned for these reasons," said Sherri Yaughn, a librarian who set up the exhibit at the Hills Branch.

"A lot of the classics are

banned in different states, and a Morniam-Webster dictionary was banned from the Sparks, Nev., el-ementary schools because a teacher said it contained obsceni-ties."

Other examples of banned or challenged books:

■ "A Thousand Acres," by Jane Smiloy, winner of the 1991 Pulitzer Prize for fiction. It was banned at the Lynden, Wash, High School because "it has no literary value."

■ "The Little Mermaid" by Hans Christian Andersen. It was challenged because it was "pornographic" and contained "astanic pictures."

■ "The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pitman" by Ernest Gaines. It was pulled after complaints about racial siurs in the book.

■ "Little House on the Prairie by Wilder Sturgis, S.D., objected to the book because of statements considered derogatory to Native Americans.

■ "The Complete Fairy Toles of The Brothers Grimm." It was restricted due to excessive violence, negative portroyals of female characters and anti-Semitic references.

Most of these books are well-known, but are considered dan-gerous or objectionable by indi-viduals or groups who would deny

others access to them.
Does the Farmington Commu-nity Library ban books? "Not that I know of . . . not since I've been here, anyway," answered Vaughn.

The barned books exhibit is sponsored the American Library Association, the American Booksellers Association, the American Booksellers Foundation for Free Expression, the Association of American Publishers, the American Society of Journalists and Authors, and the National Association of College Stores.

It is endorsed by the Center for the Book of the Library of Congress.

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
