## Barnett: Save property values, way of life

Wick Barnett says she believes lo-cal government should put its citi-zons concerns first. The proposition sounds simple enough, but sometimes has gotten loat in city council politics, said the Farmington Hills City Council chail lenger, one of five candidates for three council soats in the Nov, Telection. "Three should be no compromise with our property values and with our way of life," cald the 41-year-old mother of two. A former professional singer, Bar-
