# Hills OKs land purchase for expansion of library

Farmington Hills is buying
land next to its library on 12 Mile
to provide for an expansion.
The Hills City Council unanimously approved buying 2.57
acres of land bordering the west
side of the 12 Mile branch property for \$550,000.
"We will use money from the
sewer fund on a ioan basis," said
Tom Biasell, director of public
services.
Councilman Jon Grant said
that after the library beard, and
the Farmington and Farmington
Hills city councils met, the plan
seemed the best way to solve a
space problem at the library
A tax proposal to pay for a new
library failed two times, the last

time being in August of 1993.

"We (the library) do not have enough money to buy the land," said Library Board Treasurer Bob Plummer.

Farmington Hills will buy the land, and if the library builds the expansion as expected, it can buy the land from the city, probably through a voted bond issue.

"This is quicker and easier if we (the city) own the property," said Hills Finance Director Charles Rosch.

If the expansion does not go through, the city can then sell the property.

"It hasn't been decided yet, but my guess is that the property south of the library, which is now the parking let, would be used for the expansion and the new prop-

erty would become the parking lot." Plummer said.

The council also enacted an ordinance allowing outdoor scating as an accessory use to restaurants in the city.

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



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
