The sculpture is a bronze casting of an original piece presented
to St. Dunatan's member Templin Licklider in 1938. St. Dunstan's possession of the piece is

Nearly 1,000 volunteers play a critical role in keeping the museum open and running. When severe state funding cuthacks in 1991 reduced museum staff to half its original number, volunteer ranks swelled to help fill the gap.

one or more of the eight service committees under the Volunteer Committee umbrella. These are Art to the Schools Decenta, Gallery Information, Gallery Service, Museum Docents, Museum Shops, Speakers Bureau, Staff Adies and Volunteer Membership.
