

Court order ties up OCC faction

Call them the Frustrated Faction.

Five Oakland Community College trustees who want to fire the chancellor and replace the board chair were thwarted again Monday, this time by a court order.

"You are unable to remove me during the (Open Meetings Act) lawsuit," said board chair Janice Simmons as she turned down a motion to amend the bylaws limiting her term in office.

Simmons at 4 p.m. Monday — two hours prior to the meeting — obtained a temporary restraining order from Oakland Circuit Judge Steven Andrews against trustees Sandra Ritter, apparent leader of the Frustrated Faction, and Judith Wiser, board vice chair.

Simmons is represented by Pontiac attorney Elbert Hatchett. A process server dropped the legal papers on Ritter's lap during Monday's OCC board meeting in the central office in Bloomfield Hills. Ritter let it fall to the floor unopened and left the meeting without picking it up. Wiser was absent.

A hearing is scheduled in circuit court Thursday, Oct. 5, on whether to make the order a permanent injunction.

Simmons has been joined by trustee Anne Scott in efforts to keep the Frustrated Faction from firing Chancellor Patsy Calkins, one of the most popular leaders in OCC history because of her leadership in a millage campaign.

Scott is chief plaintiff in the Open Meetings Act suit, pending before Oakland Circuit Judge Jessica Cooper. It charges the other faction with violating the act by deliberating secretly prior to delivering an ultimatum to Calkins that she quit or be fired.

The five defendants in that suit, besides Ritter and Wiser, are trustees Pamela Davis, Douglas Wakefield and Carol Crow.

"Two people are trying to control five board members," Wakefield said Monday night. Davis, angered at being unable to act on the proposed rules change, got up and left the meeting, which was adjourned a minute later.

Calkins, though suffering from a bad cold, issued a detailed reply to Ritter's week-ago charge that

she kept the board uninformed about an Internal Revenue Service audit.

"Wait until we have the audit complete," the chancellor said. "We have no control over auditors. They don't tell us when they're coming; they just show up."

Calkins said the dispute with IRS is over taxes due on "contract" workers, particularly in the Business & Professional Institute. The federal tax collector wants them treated as employees rather than independent contrac-

tors. "We are challenging IRS on their definition of employee," Calkins told the board.

Replied Ritter: "The issue is not the audit but not being told. The board is hired by the community, and the community expects us to know everything about the college."

The board is due to meet at 6 this evening to interview candidates for a construction manager. Five candidates are seeking the job of handling renovation projects now that OCC has a property tax increase that will bring in \$35 million a year for seven years.

BABES volunteers sought

Farmington Families in Action is looking for volunteers to present the BABES program to Farmington third-graders.

BABES, which stands for Beginning Alcohol And Addiction Basic Education Studies, has been presented to third-graders for 10 years.

BABES is a seven-week course that is taught in half-hour classes. During this time, trained volunteers present information on feelings, peer pressure, decision making, alcohol and drugs, getting help with problems, and sexual abuse.

The students have the opportunity to work with BABES puppets and activity pages, engage in discussions and ask questions.

Volunteers are trained through BABESWORLD in Southfield, at no charge. The fee is paid for by Farmington Families in Action. Volunteers are asked to make a two-year commitment to the program, presenting at a minimum of two schools per year.

Through BABES, the students learn that they can share their feelings, cope with difficult situations, and turn to others for assistance when needed.
