Granger's 5 TDs lift Hawks, 48-7



Jason Granger had a big game Friday night, and that translated into a big win for Farmington Hills Harrison. The Hawks rolled over Northville 48-7 in a pivotal Western Division football game.

EVEYDODY KNOWS JASON Granger is an excellent running back, but the game he had Friday was an extraordinary performance even for him.

Granger rushed for 283 yards and five touchdowns in Farmington Hills Harrison's 48-7 win over host Northville in a key Western Division football game.

"All the credit goes to the line," "All the credit goes to the line," Granger said. "They were blasting off the line and making holes for me, and was just running through them."

Once past the line of scrimmage, Granger twisted, hurdled and dodged his way through the Northville de-

fense, scoring two TDs on runs of 55 and 50 yards.

A pair of 10-yard TD runs in the first half were preceded by runs of 38 and 50 yards. He also dived over the top for a 2-yard TD in the second half.

"They just pursued a little too much," Granger said of the Northvilla defense, "I looked at the films from '33 and '34, and I had a lot of cut-backs. I said I was going to do that, come off the ball and cut bark."

Granger's contribution was obvi-us, but Northville coach Darrell ichumacher said the quality of Har-ison's defense can't be overlooked.

The Hawks held Northville back Aneil Kersey to 63 yards — less than half of his average of 150 per game — on 17 earlies. Half of that came on a 30-yard TD run late in the first half. Hartison's pass defense bent but didn't break as Northville querter-back Scott Vigh completed 11 of 18 passes for 125 yards, but the Hawks allowed only 106 rushing yards.

"As much as people talk about their offense, you have to understand their defense is as good as any," Schumacher said. "That's how they win games, with defense and field position," when you think you have one of


