


Day in court: A Farmington man, facing drug manufacturing charges, has been bound over for trial in Oakland County Circuit Court. /4A

atudy session. District officials are looking into the feasibility of the sport with the recept opening of Farmington Hills ite Arena.


In the committee's recommendation, pleyers from all three high achools would play on one unified team that would start play in 1996-197. A second and third team could be

Farmington Public Schools atudents can look forward to a neverending cab ride on the info highway.

The district his entered a five-year agreement with Macomb-Oakiand Area Network, which will allow full access on the Internet. Farmington schools will pay \$7,500 for each of the first two years and \$10,000 a year for three years and \$15,000 total.
