Arraignment set in hit-run death

A date has been set for the Oak-land County Circuit Court ar-raignment of a man accused of the Sept. 25 drunken driving killing of a 13-year-old Farmington Hills

of a 13-year-old Farmington Hills by. Christopher Phillip Smith Jr., 22, will be arraigned before Judge Rudy Nichola at 8:30 a.m. Oct. 20 on charges of drunken driving, leaving the scene of a fatal acti-dent and manslaughter. He faces up to 15 years in prison if convict-ed.

In Smith's preliminary examination Wednesday, his attorney, Ellas Escobedo asked that Smith's ball be lowered, but 47th District Court Judge Fred Harris ruled that it be kept at \$1 million.

"He (Smith) is taking it real hard," said Lori Henry of her flance's ordeal, "I didn't really know what to expect (Wednesday)."

Ifteny said Smith had not been able to see his 4-month-old son since his sares ton the night of the accident, which killed David Klenke.

A woman who had been jogging at the time near the accident scene on 10 Mile had testifled that a black car with fresh damage had been driving from the



scene at more than 100 mph. Another woman, who had been returning with her husband from the grocery store, identified Smith in court as the driver of a black Food Thunderbird later identified as the car driven that night by Smith at the time (72.2 pm.) of the accident. The car is registered to Henry, who was working that day and had not seen her finnee. The boy was run into in front of his 11-year-old brother Stephen and died from the injuries. The two had been riding their bikes

home on the south shoulder of 10 Mile.

The car was found at Nine Mille cast of Inkster near where police arrested Smith at about 10 pm. on the night of the accident. He had a blood slochol level of .17 percent, according to testimony. A level of .1 percent is considered too drunk to drive in Michigan. Smith's friend Mark Cillion testified that the two had driven from Farmington to Okemos that afternoon so that Smith could give blood for a paternity determi-

nation. On the return trip, Smith began drinking beer, Clifton sald. The two went to a party in Farmington Hills and played cards with some other friends, Clifton said. Smith drank more beer and a haff of a fifth of Janel's whitey before getting into a light and passing out on the lawn.

Clifton said that at about 7 p.m. Smith "squealed his tires" as he left the party in anger.

Smith remains in custody in the Oakland County Jail.
