Granger breaks Hawks' rush mark

Farmington Hills Harrison's football faithful re-leased a group of green and yellow balloons as Fri-day's opening kickoff sailed through the air.

And then Jason Granger, a dezzling senior tail-back, deflated Walled Lake Western's upeat hopes and launched his name into the record book.

Granger rashed for three touchdowns, a school-record 317 yards to break the standard set four years ago by older brother Roy and help the Hawks shutout the host Warriors 32-0. It clinched an

outright Western Lakes Activities Association Western Division championship.

"It feels good. I wan't coming up here expecting
to break the (single-game rushing) record," said
Granger, who accomplished the feat on just 20 carries. "I just came up here to win this game and
that's what we did.
"But it's great to come out of here with a school

Former Harrison star Roy Granger gained 205 yards on 21 carries during a 34-7 win over Cheboygan in the 1991 Class BB state championship game. Jason missed tying the mark by 12 yards or Sept. 29 against Northville but it was evident from the opening play he might have another shot.

Granger, 5-fnot-8 and 155 pounds, took a toss pitch on the game's first play from scrimmage and raced 80 yards untouched for a touchdown and a quick 6-0 lead.
