

Strong finish lifts Hawks to 3rd straight grid title



Harrison High got a big boost from one of its smallest football players Friday. The Hawks rallied behind senior Jason Granger to overcome an 18-17 deficit and defeat Livonia Stovenson 31-18 for the Western Lakes championship.

The numbers will say it was Farm-legton Hills Harrison's 11th Western Lakes Activities Association football title, seventh in the last eight years and third in a row. But the Hawke' 31-18 champion-ship conquest Friday over host Livo-nia Stavenson was dialed up by No. 2 in the green and gold jersey — 5-foot-8, 155-pound senior speedster Jason Greeners.

After squandering what appeared to be a commanding 17-0 halfilms

lead, the Hawks needed a pair of scores in the final 10 minutes to crase an 18-17 deficit to win the battle of divisional champs.

Granger, although gimpy and bloodled, broke the Spartans' back with an electifying 87-yard kickoff return with only 944 remaining to put the Hawks back on top, 23-18. He then cut loose for 40 yards on the naxt series and brought home the WLAA tropby for Harrison with a 4-yard touchdown run and two-point conversion sweep with 6:17 tog.
