The Falcons had five straight scoring chances that went wide of the net or were stopped by Berger before North reversed the ball and took a 1-0 lead.

Hearn controlled the ball into the middle and lifted a high shot that got under the crossbar and over the reach of Farmington goalie Paul Mitchell.

It was never the same game again as the Raiders took second half action when Brandon McKelley was fouled and converted a penalty kick with 6:11 left in the first half.

"When we got the first one, it really helped our confidence," McKelley said. "And the penalty kick added all the more momentum. We haven't been able to go into halftime with such a confident goal in a long time."

North had a goal nullified by an offside call early in the second half, but Hearn scored his second at 2:50 to give the Raiders a three-goal lead.

"After the first goal, things just changed," Farmington coach Luke Juncal said. "Then we let in a few weak goals, and that put us in a deep hole."

"The penalty kick kinda froze my team. It looked like they felt a 2-0 deficit was something they couldn't make up. It hurt our confidence."

"Overall, we just did not play a very good game. We failed to clear the ball, and when we did we kept giving it right back to North."

Farmington's Chris Meyer scored the first of two goals at 20:51, but Jeff Ibbotson restored North to a three-goal lead two minutes later.

Meyer made it 4-2 with 12½ minutes remaining. Andy Kolacki and Patrick Falon assisted on the Farmington goals.

Benji Salter, Justin Street and

McKelley were credited with assists for the Raiders, who fired 10 shots.

"When it was 3-1, they were relying at that point, and they thought they had a good shot," Meteyer said. "With 30 minutes as they have, it was still a contest. Ibbotson's goal really took the pressure off."

There was only one yellow card in the game — a major improvement over the first meeting in which 13 were issued.

The Raiders accomplished the victory without defender Tawoyai Oyama and forward Chris Kemp.

Oyama received a red card for a handball infraction in a scoring situation in the previous game, and Kemp suffered a broken wrist in the first Farmington game.

"We went without one of our best defensive players and our leading goal scorer, so I was real surprised when the kids were playing with such confidence," Meteyer said.

Regardless of what happens Friday, it's been a successful season for the Raiders, he added.

"We won more games than in the last two seasons combined," Meteyer said.
