# Tips to treat kids to safe Halloween

Farmington Hills police and Farmington public safety remind parents to make sure young Hal-loween revelers "play it safe for Hallowsen."

perents to make sure young Halloween revelors "play it safe for Halloween."

Chris Cogar, Hills crime prevention technician, and Joe Schornack, Fermington fire marshal, said following some basic safety rules can ensure a safe, fun Halloween.

Parents should:

Make sure your child's costume allows freedom of movement and good visibility, It should either be light color or have reflective strips on it and also be fireproof. Use makeup to paint faces instead of obscuring vision with a mask. If possible, have children trick or treat before dark.

Check to make sure costumes are made of flame retardant material. Keep hem lines short enough to prevent tripping and avoid loose, baggy sleeves or billowing skirts. Avoid filmsy materials such as lightweight cotton fabrics which are easily ignited.

Use lattery powered lights —never candles — to light jack-lanterns. Instruct children to stay away from open flames.

Insist that your children trick

er-dry cornstalks and other har, vest-season items. Keep them away from sources of heat. Don't ite them block doorways or salars. If you are driving on Hallow, een, take care. Watch for trick-or-treaters who will be too busy to watch out for you.

Be certain that small children are under supervision at all times. Before your children eat any treats, check them over. Use your discretion about any homemade treats — even with an address label. The safest rule is to throw wayped or in good condition.

Discard fruit or cut into pieces before eating to make sure it is all fruit and has not been tampered with.

Spensor a party in place of trick or treating.

If you find anything suspicious in your child's treat bag, contact the police or public salety department.
