Transplants have a 50 percent success rate, Steele said. A lot depends on age, type of disease and nevious treatment.

But, added Juela mother, "I don't go on numbers."

Throughout the ordeal, Joel continues to defy statistics through his courage and spirit. "So many of his nurses have said he has shown evidence of inner strength," Linda said. "They say you don't see that in many kids.

"His attitude has been such a blessing. Not only has he been re-
