School district surveys parents

The district has mailed some 8,000 12-page questionnaires to Farmington school parents, asking their views on a variety of educational topics.
The survey is a result of the district a Mission 2007 goals. People without children will be surveyed over the telephone after the holidays, said Sue Zurvelec, assistant superintendent valec, assistant superintendent for Staff and Community Ser-

vice.

Parents are asked their opinions on possibly expanding
magnet school concept and
starting an academy of basic

education.
Questions are frank.
Respondents are asked to
give letter grades, A to F, on
the district's performance in
teaching skills, curriculum,
standards and safety. Answers
are confidential.

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They are also asked, point-blankly, if tax dollars paid for Farmington schools are a good buy.

"We really sought to gauge the community to the degree they are satisfied with us in certain areas." Zurvalce said. "It's like a customer satisfaction survey."

Officials want people to return surveys as soon as possible.

Superintendent Bob Maxfield sent a letter to parents asking them to respond. Also for non-English speaking parents, the Billingual Department is offering assistance.

The questionnire takes approximately 20 minutes to fill out, Zurvalce said.

"We'd like them to return them as soon as possible," she said. "We haven't set a deadine, but within the next couple of weeks."

Results will be made public after the first of the year.
