The Farmington Hills City
Council must deal with an issue
that seems to be bubbling just below the surface.

In fact, oil and gas exploration

Planning Commissioner Mike
Sweeney, who has many years of
engineering experience in the petroleum industry both in Michigan and Texas, said people

should not compare the current situation with what they have seen on TV or in the movies.

Sweeney, who worked for Teneco, said if the operation were supproved, it would not include traditional oil derricks, but more modest saw horse well beads.

"I saked the questions I needed to because they weren't showing the equipment I thought they would need in their site plan," he said. "I was satisfied with their answers."

Sweeney and Commissioner Brends Kandt said they believe he issue is now appropriately in the hands of the city council. "I would like to see what the city council does with it," Kandt said. "They'il have to look above and beyond the site plan."

Sweeney said that whatever the result, he doesn't expect crude spewing over Farmington Hills neighborhoods.
