Hughes said. "He loved to go fish-ing, hunting and spend a lot of time out of doors. And he was very safety oriented."

Hughes said his uncle had even set up the procedure of meeting at time intervals to make sure every-one was OK.

"That's exactly how they found that he was in trouble," Hughes said.

The father of six had not been The father of six had not been wearing a safety harness at the time. Sheriff Wayer said. But Hughes, an Ann Arbor resident, and Carolynn Fodor said he had stuck to a low-fat diet in recent years and had nitroglycerin tablets on him, just in case of problem.

"He was a very skilled hunter,"
Carolynn Fodor said. "It's not like he was some bumbling hunter. In fact his ski mask was off, which shows that he might have which shows that he might have been having some kind of prob-

Marvin Fodor was a foreman at Rouge Steel, a subsidiary of Ford Motor Co. in Dearborn.

Many of his hunting friends cut short their trips to come to his fu-neral in Farmington Hills, Caro-lynn Feder said.

"Once they heard about it, they came back from as far away as Wisconsin," she said.

She had been the first to arrive at the acene of a fatal hit-and-run accident Sept. 25.

"I had taken the younger brother (Stephen Klenke, 11) sort of under my wing after seeing that terribly mangled body," she said. "The Klenkes have been very supportive to me."

Marvin Fodor was born in De-troit and is survived by his wife Carolynn; daughters Jodi and Angela; sons Robert, Gregory, Benjamin and Joel; his mother Elizabeth and a brother.

Funeral arrangements were handled by McCabe Funeral Home on 12 Mile. Marvin Fodor was buried at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Southfield. Memorial tributes should go to the Michigan Lupus Foundation.
