

Marian overcomes Salem in OT

Birmingham Marian's girls basketball team had plenty to be thankful for over the holiday weekend.

On Thursday, the Mustangs counted their blessings among family and friends around the dinner table. On Friday, Marian had its prayers answered on the basketball court with an exciting overtime playoff victory, 49-47, over Plymouth Salem at Berkley High School.

Marian claimed its second regional championship in three years when sophomore guard Bren Walas threw up an off-balance shot from five feet away with just five seconds remaining in the overtime. Salem raced right back downcourt but did not have enough time to counter Walas's shot.

"It was one of those kinds of games where you had to hang in there and make the play at the end," said Salem's veteran coach Fred Thomann. "And they made the play."

Marian (16-8) now advances to the Class A state quarterfinal scheduled for 7 p.m. Tuesday at Ferndale High School against Wall Lake Central. The Mustangs are excited to be among the eight teams remaining in the state tournament.

"We took our lumps all year and I never thought we could have 16 wins," said Marian coach Mary Lillie-Cicerone. "We never dreamt we'd be this far. We're very happy."

But our bench has come up and played well and the seniors have played well. We got beat by some pretty good teams this year," she said.

And Salem was another good team that gave Marian fits.

The Rocks, who finished with a fine 17-7 overall record, enjoyed a big rebounding edge and matched the Mustangs with an aggressive defensive style. In the end, Marian was 11-of-15 from the line, Salem 10-of-19.

The Mustangs held a slim 22-20 halftime advantage, but the Rocks bounced back with five of the third quarter's first seven lead, bounced back, and forth through the rest of regulation time.

Salem's Angela Sillmon and Amanda Abraham converted back-to-back lay-ups and put their team up 41-38 with 4:22 remaining in the fourth quarter. Marian tallied the next three points on a basket by Walas and free throw by Alexis Koening and regulation ended with the teams tied at 41.

Senior guard Brandi Bentley put Marian up by three quickly in OT with a driving lay-up and the accompanying free throw after she was fouled. But Salem countered on its trip down the court when junior Janelle Sterling swished home the only three-pointer of the game to tie the score again.

Each team then made three free throws, the last two by Salem's Abraham, to tie the score at 47-47 with 15 seconds remaining. Marian in-bounded the ball to Walas who raced downcourt, found a slight opening and threw up a wild, line-drive shot that rattled home for what proved to be the game-winning basket.

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Borgess coasts to win over DePorres

Redford Bishop Borgess's road to a third-straight Class C girls basketball state championship remained smooth Wednesday night, as the Spartans defeated Detroit St. Martin DePorres, 70-29, in a regional final at Petersburg-Summerfield.

Borgess, 23-2 overall, jumped to a 19-2 lead after one quarter. Things were so easy that the Spartans' top player, senior guard Misty Reese, went scoreless until three seconds remained in the first quarter when she rebounded her only miss and scored on a five-foot shot.

The Spartans led 40-7 at halftime and 56-20 following three quarters.

The win sends Borgess to Tuesday's quarterfinal at Armada High School.

No one scored in double figures, but six Spartans had at least av-

en points. Reese, sophomore guard Christina Anderson and junior center Candice Finley scored nine points each.

Senior guard LaZandra White and sophomore forward Koren Merchant had eight points each and senior guard Adriane Bryant added seven.

Reserves Regina Respert and Brandi Caraffelli had six points each.

White finished four of five from the field. She had no trouble finishing on the fast break, which is something coach Dave Mann has been discussing with her.

In Monday's regional semifinal victory, Mann reminded White she's not Michael Jordan after White missed a layup on a fast break.

"Dave was getting after me to slow down on the break," White

said. "This time I laid it in there like Joe Dumars or something. I don't have a problem with (not) scoring as long as we win games. Our mission is complete once we win the state."

Finishing plays on the fast break is one of the things the Spartans still have trouble with, according to Mann.

"I told them at halftime we did a much better job of being efficient on the break," Mann said. "We have too many kids, when they catch the ball on the break, they have an 'all or nothing' mentality. We're trying to get them to come to 'jump' stops, have their body under control."

The Spartans held DePorres top player, 6-4 junior guard Shari Hill, scoreless through the first half.

She scored her first basket with 5:05 remaining in the third quarter on a left-handed hook in the lane, and finished with four

points. Sophomore guard Carmen Woolfolk led DePorres, 15-7 overall, with 11 points.

The Spartans used a box-and-one defense against DePorres. Bryant, Reese and Anderson took turns guarding Hill.

The Eagles made only two of 23 shots in the first half. They were outscored 27-8 by the taller Spartans by halftime.

"We knew they were going to try to shut down Shari," DePorres coach Tony Taylor said. "Our other players didn't step up like we anticipated."

Mann, nicknamed "Koo," was one of the few Spartans who heard from Mann on the sidelines. She was fine on the offensive end, but too lackadaisical on defense, according to Mann.

"I want to play defense, but my legs won't do what my brain tells them to do," said Merchant, half-grinning, with Mann listening during the post-game celebration.
