Country Day stops wing-T and result is Class B title

Like yesterday's turkey, Detroit Country Day snapped the wing away from Muskegon Orchard View's vaunted wing-T to claim supremacy among Class B football teams.

Spearheaded by a defense eager to make amends for a porous performance in last year's state title game, the Yellow Jackets defended the Cardinals' feared wing-T offense to near perfection, scoring a 28-14 victory Friday at the Silverdome.

It was Country Day's first state title since 1986 and second overall.

"The first one you win always carries more of an emotional feeling," DCD coach Joe D'Angelo said. "This time around we gained confidence with a lot of tough games."

"I'm just happy for all our seniors after last year. We had 21 seniors here who remembered sitting in the locker room (following a 50-41 loss to Belding) and knowing exactly what they had to do this year."

That meant solving the intricacies of the wing-T — an offense Belding used to sting the Jackets.

"We faced some teams this year that ran the wing-T, and we even scrimmaged Marine City just in case we would meet a team later on," D'Angelo said.

The defense was led by seniors Samy Aburashed and Berry Treadwell with nine tackles apiece. Ebbie Parsons and Jim Imeland (five each) helped limit

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the Cardinals (11-2) to 174 total yards, all coming on the ground, and a pair of meaningless second-half touchdowns.

The Yellow Jackets, who netted 140 yards passing and 130 more rushing, took a 21-0 halftime lead on touchdowns from quarterback Josh Collins, running back Omari Jett and Imaland.

Collins' 1-yard sneak culminated an impressive 70-yard opening drive by the Yellow Jackets that took 10 plays and 5:15 off the clock.

The Yellow Jackets avoided a disastrous situation moments later when sophomore Javin Hunter was ruled to have muffed a punt that was recovered by the Cardinals in the end zone. High school rules state once a muffed ball crosses the goal line, the play is ruled a touchback.

"I would have to look at the films a little more closely, but I wouldn't question the call at all," Orchard View coach John Shillito said. "It could have been a key factor, but we came right back and caused a fumble. We just didn't score with it."

DCD followers saw their offense freed off another stellar defensive stand, stopping the Cardinals on four plays inside the G-yard line, to move in front 14-0 midway through the second period. Jett, subbing for the injured Brett Gasper, took a handoff from Collins and scampered 12 yards into the end zone to cap a 12-play, 97-yard drive.

The lead grew to 21-0 two minutes later when Imaland scooped up a fumble and dashed 42 yards to the end zone.

"I had a similar thing happen to me earlier this season and I got caught," Imaland said of his Class B record-setting effort. "This time I picked it up and ran as fast as I could."

Place-kicker James Kogut's third of four extra points sent the Yellow Jackets into halftime holding a comfortable 21-0 lead.

"At halftime, I reminded the team of the score last year (DCD led Belding 33-14)," D'Angelo said. "We were in a similar situation where we were going to kick off and look for a defensive stop."

The Yellow Jackets were able to do just that, but were unable to stop the Cardinals on their next possession. Senior Steve Mitchell raced 46 yards for a touchdown, and teammate Kevin Fitzgerald tackled on a two-point run to bring the Cardinals to within 21-8.

Following an exchange of punts, the Yellow Jackets put the game out of reach when Gasper, hobbled by a sore ankle, plunged in from a yard out.

Orchard View rounded out the game's scoring with 31 seconds remaining on a 20-yard jaunt by Fitzgerald.

Jett paced the DCD ground attack with 85 yards on 16 carries, and Collins thrived in another strong effort through the air, completing nine of 16 attempts for 140 yards.

Mitchell led Orchard View with 143 yards on 18 rushes.

'Jackets were ready this time

Detroit Country Day's defense wasn't fooled again.

Helped by experience, some insightful preparation and tremendous defensive line play, the Yellow Jackets' stop troops had fun turning the tables on the powerful wing-T offense Friday night at the Silverdome.

The 28-14 victory over Muskegon Orchard View was just enough for veteran coach Joe D'Angelo's team, but stuffing the same offense that befuddled them in last year's shocking Class B final was even better.

"We wanted to get some revenge against the wing-T," said senior defensive end Jim Imaland. "It was basically our destiny, to come back here and win, and it just happened we were playing a wing-T team, which is even better."

Country Day (12-1) surrendered 333 rushing yards to Belding's

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wing-T offense last year in a 50-41 defeat. But the Yellow Jackets knew what to expect this time.

DCD faced the wing-T or variations of it four previous times this season, and D'Angelo and his coaching staff also made a critical adjustment.

"We tried to play (Belding) with our 4-3 defense last year," D'Angelo said. "This year we had five people down and we covered both guards, and I don't think there are too many teams that have covered people."

"We were just trying to bottle up their guards, and we put Ebbie (Parsons) up on the center. That was the key in trying to disrupt all of their blocking schemes."

Parsons certainly did his job. The 6-foot, 235-pound senior racked up five tackles and was a constant disruption.

"My main job was to drive the center back and try to knock down the guards pulling," Parsons said. "The key to stopping the wing-T is for everybody to execute their roles, and we did it well tonight."

The Cardinals, who entered the contest averaging just over 360 yards a game on the ground, mustered just 48 first-half rushing yards as DCD built a 21-0 lead.

"The key defensively was the interior," Orchard View coach John Shillito said. "I felt their interior kids were fantastic along with (Berry) Treadwell at linebacker. He's a physical kid."

Perhaps DCD's biggest defensive stop came late in the third quarter. Orchard View (11-2) had closed the gap to 21-8 and then forced Country Day to punt.

The Cardinals started from their own 24-yard line, but two running plays netted minus-2 yards and senior Amar Katranji caught quarterback J.R. Swanson for a 3-yard loss on third down.

"I think experience and knowing about the wing-T really helped us a lot," Imaland said. "We knew what they ran, and we were ready to play this year."

Kosmowski was outstanding on kickoff, however, putting four of his five into the end zone.

Want more records?
The Shamrocks set new AA records for most rushes as a team (50), rushing yards (320), most points in a quarter (15 in the third) and most points in a game by a winning team (24). They also allowed the fewest net yards (49), net yards rushing (11) and fewest rushes (19) ever in AA title games.

Rich Depula ran for a four-yard touchdown on fourth and two with 6:49 left in the third quarter to put CC up 14-0. It must have felt like a reward for Depula, who has been used in limited action on offense but been one of the Shamrocks' standouts on defense in the playoffs.

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down. CC took over at its own 49 and took nine plays to score on a 13-yard pass from Call to Gilbo with 4:17 remaining in the third.

The extra point by Kosmowski made the lead 21-0.

Kosmowski added a 23-yard field goal with 8:02 remaining to finish the scoring.

"Their offensive line play was outstanding. I'll give all the attention I can to that," Ho coach Mike Smith said. "We were 'there' a lot, but they cut back and we had arm tackles we haven't had all year."

Meeting adjourned at 9:10 p.m.


