### March trial date set in hit-run case

An Oakland County Circuit Court Judge has set a March 8 trial date in the case of a Detroit man accused of the drunken driving killing of a 13-year-old Farmington Hills boy. Christopher Phillip Smith Jr., 22, is charged with drunk driving, leaving the scene of a fatal accident and man-alsungher in connection with the Sept. 25 death of David Klenke, who was hit by a car as he rode his bike on

Smith is being held in the Oakland
County Jali in Ileu of a \$1 million
cash bond. He faces up to 18 years in
prison if convicted.

The trial date was set Friday during a short pretrial hearing, before
Judge Rudy Nichola. Smith stood
handcuffed and cald in orange jall issue clothes as his attornoy, Elias
Escobedo, and Assistant Prosecutor
Marc Barron whispered with Nichola,
who then set this trial date. Smith
